Lincoln School Request For Proposals Announced

Per our previous communications regarding the Lincoln School, the Lincoln School Committee and NOHC Board posted a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the Lincoln School building on April 21, 2023. Copies of the RFP are available on our website or by request. We encourage outcomes that focus on supporting our local community and shared history, such as:

- Preservation of the iconic building or the facade of the school that faces north.
- Any new construction on the property to reflect or complement the architectural design of Lincoln School.
- Purchase by a nonprofit organization that provides social, health, housing or other community support services whose mission is compatible with the NOHC.
- An organization that will renovate, maintain and operate the Lincoln School building and/or the north portion of the campus.
- A cooperative use agreement with the purchaser for the NOHC to access space in the renovated Lincoln School or replacement building(s).

Proposals should be submitted by mail to the NOHC at PO Box 1327, Port Angeles, WA 98362. If you know an organization or individual who might have an idea or project for the Lincoln School, please spread the word!



WA Humanities SHARP Grant Wrap-Up

Our 2022 WA Humanities SHARP grant helped us play "catch-up" on a laundry list of backlogged collections organization and digitization tasks that had piled up since the beginning of the pandemic, the most important being the implementation of our new Scope of Collections. During the COVID-19 pandemic shutdown, a committed group of volunteers were able to keep our library open for a few hours a week, but the Center lost momentum processing new donations that continued to arrive. Without volunteers on hand to accession and catalog these items, they began to accumulate in great number.

Our 2022 SHARP grant award allowed us to train new volunteers and to work our way

through most of this backlog. Just sorting and inventorying the materials that had been donated took us nearly two months. We were also able to implement our new Scope of Collections while working our way through the materials, using this as a training opportunity for our volunteers who will turn their attention to our broader collections once we have finished working through the backlog. We conducted multiple workshops with volunteers training them to work through library, archival, and museum cataloguing processes, which has allowed the NOHC to start moving forward again as an organization. Without a doubt, the NOHC is a stronger organization than we were a year ago, in part thanks to the support of Humanities Washington.

Boys in the Boat

History just doesn't happen in the past. It's all around us and happening all the time. We just need to step back and look for it.

For a long time, Joe Rantz and his contribution to the US Gold Medal win in the 1936 Olympics held in Germany was a mostly a local story. The crew teams at the U of W knew about it and it was part of Crewing history, but George Pocock, the builder of the boat, was better known. There wasn't a lot of local hoopla about a boy who had been abandoned in Sequim by his family when he was 15. His scrappiness and his drive to succeed and his will to survive were foundational in the U of W win.

In the early 1980's Matt Dryke was the only local boy to be mentioned with signs at the Sequim city limits honoring him as an Olympic Gold Medalist in 1984. That changed with the Publication of Daniel James Brown's 2014 publication of The Boys in the Boat: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Berlin Olympics.

Suddenly Joe Rantz and his team were the center of attention and again, the signs honoring Olympic Medalists were updated to include his name. KCTS 9, Seattle's PBS station, produced a half-hour documentary that was picked up by the National PBS stations. There were author talks in conjunction with Joe's family. Schools adopted the book as part of their curriculum, and the Olympic Peninsula got a brush with fame as people came to visit



Now nearly a decade later, Joe Rantz and the UW crew team are getting a chance to shine again. A wonderful new chapter of history in the making is going on.

- George Clooney is directing a new movie, The Boys in the Boat.
- The Members of the Sequim High School Interact Club have successfully lobbied for the movie's premier to take place here on the Olympic Peninsula in Sequim by taking over the social media campaign to help the Sequim Rotary's project: the Joe Rantz Rotary Youth House to benefit Sequim's homeless youth.
- The Rotary Club project honors Joe's early life, when he lived alone for two years, working in logging, doing odd jobs and excelling in school. They have just raised the first \$28,000 of the \$750,000 needed.
- On March 31 Joe Rantz's daughters Judy Rantz-Willman and her sister Jennarose Rantz-Murdagh gave a talk about their father at the Dungeness Schoolhouse.
- The Interact Club at Sequim High School, whose whose goal is to promote youth leadership and community service, is continuing is work to make a difference locally by volunteering to assist with projects for Habitat for Humanity, Sequim's Spring Service Day, and others.


Clallam County is adding another layer to our fascinating history. Keep an eye out for history in the making.

The McClinton Family Photo Collection

I began this project in April 2013. The initial objective was to scan the negatives for preservation in digital format. The collection consists of fourteen boxes of black and white glass plate photographic negatives containing a total 398 negatives.

By 1886 the family had moved from Nevada, to California, and in that year moved to Jefferson County, Washington, where Judge McClinton was appointed District Judge prior to winning election. In 1890, Judge McClinton was elected Superior Judge of Clallam, Jefferson and Island County and the family moved to Port Angeles. It was probably about that time that Roy and Ray developed an interest in photography.


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NOHC Collections

Sequim Manis Mastodon in the News Again!

This information taken from the Texas A&M website discusses new findings pertaining to the Mastodon

found in the Sequim area.

"A team of researchers led by a Texas A&M University professor has identified the Manis bone projectile point as the oldest weapon made of bone ever found in the Americas at 13,900 years.

The team studied bone fragments embedded in a mastodon rib bone first discovered by Carl Gustafson, who conducted an excavation at the Manis site in Washington state from 1977 to 1979.

Using a CT scan and 3D software, Waters and his team isolated all the bone fragments to show it was the tip of a weapon — a projectile made from the bone of Mastodon, prehistoric relatives of elephants."

Wall Crank Telephones Transferred to JCHS



This year we are working on making space in our collections storage spaces for items currently stored in the Lincoln School, and future acquisitions. One way this is accomplished is by deaccessioning objects and artifacts that are hazardous to the collections, don't fit our scope of collections, or are duplicate items. We recently deaccessioned eight wooden wall crank telephones, keeping three phones and a switchboard for our permanent collections. Our deaccession process starts by reaching out to the donor, if possible, to inquire if they would like the items back. When this is not possible, we reach out to other museum and local historic societies to inquire whether they are interested in acquiring any of the objects. In this case, we were excited to find a new home for two of the phones with the Jefferson County Historical Society, who lack any of these models in their collections. We are very pleased that the phones will be used for education and exhibits at JCHS!
